Curriculum Completion Day (January 23rd)

Our first of two "Curriculum Completion Days" this year is coming up on Thursday, Jan 23rd. The rationale for this unique instructional day centers around supporting all students in the completion of any outstanding/incomplete work, as well as the writing of the Ministry Numeracy Assessment by all grade 10's and some 11's and 12's. Teachers will be identifying students with outstanding/incomplete work in their courses. These students will be required to attend school on Jan 23rd in order to complete these important curricular tasks. Teachers will be communicating their expectations to students and families no later then Friday, Jan 17th. Parents/Guardians will receive an email from the classroom teacher by Friday, outlining any outstanding tasks and providing instructions around times and locations which students are expected to report on Jan 23rd. Each student's schedule that day will be unique, as some will have to write the Numeracy Assessment, some will have work to complete and some may have no commitments. In the event that a student has multiple commitments on this day, the school has identified the following student priorities.

Priority #1- The Numeracy Assessment- Any student needing to write the numeracy assessment must make that their top priority and attend their scheduled sitting (am or pm).

Priority #2- Completion of Outstanding/Incomplete Work- Students will attend as requested by their teachers in order to complete identified outstanding work. The numeracy assessment takes precedent, but the student can complete outstanding work before or after their assessment sitting.

Priority #3- Optional Offerings- *In some cases teachers may choose to create additional offerings such as field trips. Participation in these activities must not come at the expense of priority 1 or 2.*

Students are required to manage their time around these priorities. Thank you in advance for your support in helping to ensure your child's attendance and active participation in their required activities on this day, both of which should aid in their successful completion of their courses.

Today's first-year university students are experiencing stress, anxiety, and depression at record levels, caused by everything from moving away from home, to social expectations, to work pressures, to academic pressures. Without intervention, the weight of all this can be overwhelming leading to various mental health conditions that can negatively impact their academic performance.

Join Rebecca Gagan, Assistant Teaching Professor, Department of English, and Founder and Director of the University of Victoria's Bounce program (www.uvic.ca/bounce) for this informative presentation to discuss strategies for successfully navigating the transition to first-year university. By changing the way we understand and talk to students about their struggles, we can help students before they become overwhelmed. This presentation will explore how to build positive coping skills that will change the course of a student's academic journey and particularly their experience of firstyear university.

Grade 10 Numeracy Assessment
THIS ASSESSMENT IS REQUIRED FOR GRADUATION

All grade 10s, some 11s and some 12s are scheduled to write the Ministry of Education's Grade 10 Numeracy Assessment on Thursday, January
23rd. Exams are scheduled for either 8:30 AM or 12:00 PM. Students need to look at the list posted in the front office window to determine the room and time that they are scheduled for. Students should arrive 15 minutes BEFORE the scheduled start time to find their assessment desk and get logged in to a computer/Chromebook (this exam is mostly completed electronically with 2 small written portions).

Students will need to bring:

- pens

- pencils

- erasers

- a scientific calculator (non-graphing one)

No other materials will be permitted into the exam. Scrap paper will be provided. Backpacks, binders, textbooks and electronic devices (e.g. phones and apple watches) will need to be left in your locker or at the designated place in each classroom.

This assessment is scored on a proficiency scale out of 4 which means that students will NOT receive a percentage or letter grade, but instead will receive a 1, 2, 3 or 4. There are not any course credits associated with this exam; instead, transcripts will show RM (Requirements Met) and a score out of 4. Please check with the university or college that you are applying to to determine the entrance standards regarding this assessment. If you need assistance with this, please see Ms. Giesbrecht in the Careers office or any of our counsellors at Oak Bay High. If a student determines that they would like or require a higher score after they have written the assessment, they will have the opportunity to re-write in future years.
